"HOW TO STUDY THE BIBLE" IS AN EXCITING SKILL TO LEARN

"The grass withers, the flower fades, but the word of our God will stand forever." Isaiah 40:8 ESV

I am passionate about learning the Bible. The primary reason is because, as Isaiah says above, life here on earth is temporary and God and his word are not. Inside the Bible we have access to truth that transcends our time and space and opens our eyes to what is really real. It is the very word of the Living God, the Almighty Father who only spoke and the universe came into being. Words from that same God about who he is and what he's done are right at our fingertips if we only open our Bibles.

Psalm 119 is filled with descriptions of savoring and delighting in God's word and the fruit that comes from it. I want to be that excited. I want us all to be that excited about God and his word. And to get there, we need to be intentionally going to the Bible, studying it, reflecting on it, putting forth some effort to understand and apply it, and talking to God about what we're reading. We'll have to deposit some time and energy into it if we want to be making withdrawals out of its storehouse.

An excellent resource for those who are hungry for God and for his truth inside the Bible is Women of the Word: How to Study the Bible with Both Our Hearts and Our Minds by Jen Wilkin. At the Tuesday night women's study we read this book together and learned that "how to" is in its title for a reason! This book is a very practical tool for anyone, male or female, who wants to take ownership of their relationship with God and his word. I am excited to practice what I have learned from this book in my own personal Bible reading and along with group Bible studies.

The chapter on studying with patience was validating because I know more than just a little what it's like to become frustrated while reading the Bible. Despite my hunger for God and the truth in his word I haven't always found studying the Bible very easy. The author acknowledged that "learning requires work. This is true of learning the Bible as it is of learning algebra. We think that learning the Bible should be as natural as breathing in and out; if knowing God's Word is so good for us,



surely he would not make it difficult for us to do so. But learning the Bible requires discipline" (p. 77). And because of this, the author made the case that a good process is

required for learning the Bible. "A good literacy-builder honors the learning process by moving through three distinct stages of understanding: *comprehension*, *interpretation*, and *application*" (p. 87). This was the ultimate "how to" chapter with numerous hands-on suggestions on how to move toward understanding through each of the three stages. It would be worth putting a copy or outline of this chapter inside your Bible in order to easily refer back to it.

The most convicting chapter for me was the chapter on studying with prayer. "Prayer is what changes our study from the pursuit of knowledge to the pursuit of God himself" (p. 103). As one of the ladies in our group put it, studying without talking with God is like knowing we are welcome anything in the house so we head straight for the pantry without stopping to talk with the person who owns the house and allowing him to host us. Grandparents delight in their small grandchildren loving what's at Gramma's house but only because they desire to create a relationship with the child too. I've been that small child in Bible study and I've learned a lot from God's word but the suggestions in this chapter have prepared me to begin developing a more mature relationship with the Author of that word instead of focusing only on what he can give me.

It is my prayer that we as a church are made up of people who are passionate about God and it is made evident through our passion for his word and our careful study of it.

I also recommend the Engaging God's Word series of Bible studies for any adult, old or young, who wants a simple study guide to aid learning specific books of the Bible. These Bible studies can be used by individuals or groups and are put together by the international organization Community Bible Study which also offers organized classes for all ages. In their classes and in this stand-alone Bible study series, CBS emphasizes the student doing much of the comprehension, interpretation and application by answering questions in order to give ownership of the Bible study to the student.

RECIPES TO SHARE

AUTUMN CASSEROLE

3 c. mashed, cooked butternut squash

¼ c. butter

1 Tablespoon brown sugar

1/4 teaspoon salt

dash of pepper

1 1/2 Tablespoon butter

6. sliced, pared cooking apples

¼ c. granulated sugar

1 1/2 c. cornflakes, coarsely crushed

½. c. chopped pecans

½ c. brown sugar

2 T. melted butter

Season mashed, cooked squash with ¼ c. butter, 1 Tablespoon brown sugar, ¼ tsp. salt and dash of pepper. Heat 1 ½ Tablespoons butter in a skillet; add sliced apples. Sprinkle with ¼ c. sugar; cover and simmer apples over low heat until barely tender, about 5 minutes.

Spread apples in a 3-quart casserole dish. Spoon mashed squash evenly over apples. Mix cornflakes with pecans, ½ c. brown sugar and 2 Tablespoons melted butter. Sprinkle over squash. Bake at 350 degrees for 15 minutes. Makes 8 servings.

MUD PIE

1 package Oreo cookies

1/4 c. melted butter or margarine

3-4 qts. coffee ice cream (Brigham's is a good brand)
Jar of Hot Fudge topping

Cool Whip, thawed or All-Purpose Cream, whipped Slivered Almonds, toasted & cooled

Milk Chocolate Bar, shaved or Heath bars, crushed

Crush Oreo cookies. (We use a blender.) Place in a bowl and add melted butter. Stir with a fork. Press crumbs into bottom of large pan (10x14 or 11x15) or divide between 2 pie plates. Freeze until firm.

Slice or scoop ice cream into crust. Lay a piece of waxed paper over ice cream and smooth top. Freeze until firm. Spoon dollops of Hot fudge (warm slightly if needed) over ice cream and gently spread. Freeze.

Spread with Cool Whip or sweetened whipped cream. Sprinkle with almonds (if desired) and chocolate shavings or crushed Heath bars. Freeze until serving time.

Thinking back to January, we remember some of our prayers: "A curriculum for the Bible classes and stamina to make it through the school year. Help for the youth group. Time to finish Seminary classes." And we are filled with thanksgiving as we see how the Lord has answered. Teaching the 6th -11th grade Bible classes was a challenge. But with the Lord's help the teens and pre-teens heard the gospel and truths about God and their neighbor. About halfway through the year we began the long-overdue chapel services for the elementary, middle, and high school students; gathering to worship the Lord, pray and reflect, when a limited schedule and resources seemed to tell us it was impossible. Another victory!

Seminary was richer than ever, and Saturdays became a haven for Ronnie; gathering with other pastors and being spiritually refueled. After many years of studies, Ronnie will finish his last two classes in December, making him a candidate to graduate with a BA in Pastoral Ministries from the Nicaraguan Bible Seminary. Graduation itself will wait for the completion of a mini thesis.

With the heavy workload, we were holding youth group on a bi-weekly basis. Convicted by the needs of the kids, we resumed the once a week schedule. And so our reasons for Thanksgiving are many! Not the least of which is the faith of the Christians here. As these brothers and sisters grow in the Lord they are eager to serve. Most years, good intentions don't last and we are scratching for help just a few months into the year. This year we have made it to November and dusting benches, washing linens, cleaning the bathroom, etc. are done with diligence and even joy. Our prayer circle has been a dear source of strength. The youth involved in the music team have shown some signs of maturity, working through problems, growing in love and forgiveness.

Our Adventurous Narnia Trip

Sheila and I want to thank all of you for your prayer support while we were in Narnia (10/9-10/18). The expedition went as prayed and hoped. The weather was unusually cool (low 80's) for which we were thankful.

Some of the key activities that we were able to accomplish by the grace of God and your prayers are as follows;

- 1. Securely delivered important supplies to m-workers that are in the country. Things like batteries, cameras, surge protectors, fans, shoes, sandals, clothing, etc. These items filled an entire large suitcase. The missionary workers purchased all these items on Amazon and shipped them directly to our home so we could securely pack and transport them with us. They were really excited to receive their supplies which will serve many different m-workers.
- 2. Visited four villages (towns) to donate books to the English section of their public library. They were especially appreciative of our commitment to return once again with additional books. Next year our focus will be more on books for children and possibly learning games. In one village, last year we noticed a

passion for basketball so we brought three basketballs and a small hand-pump. We watched some of their game and each player came over to us to shake hands and say thank you. The skill level was diverse. There might be opportunity for a mini-basketball clinic during future returns.

- **3. Prayed daily with our indigenous believer friends** which serves as encouragement and strengthens their faith. In addition, we encouraged them in their important work to translate the Word into their indigenous language and share their faith.
- 4. Brought our friends to lunch and dinner many of the days and took in a football (soccer) match. A little bit of a tussle broke out at halftime when one of the fans took exception to the witchcraft that was being used by the opposing team. This tussle evolved into a fist fight in the stands during the second half. We also had the opportunity to watch what appeared to be a practice session for a scrappy wheelchair basketball team. I had a whistle in my backpack that I was able to donate to the team to assist the coach when trying to get the teams attention. They were appreciative of the whistle and our enthusiasm during the practice as we cheered each basket and notable play. This may be an opportunity to minister in the future because only one of six players had an athletic wheelchair which made it difficult for the other five players to compete at the same level. If you have any connections, please let us know. It would be a blessing to bring ten gently used competition wheelchairs with us next September (Lord willing).
- 5. We had the opportunity to visit a family of three children and one parent that is a believer and the other follows Islam. We visited them in their new apartment because earlier in the year their previous landlord learned that one followed Jesus and evicted them. We were able to pray for them and in return our Islamic friend prayed an Islamic prayer for us. The real blessing being that the believer is able to follow Jesus and potentially raise their three children in the faith (praise God!). Over time, like the thief on the cross and by the grace of God, the non-believer may come to follow Jesus.

- 6. Watched and encouraged our indigenous friends as they were being discipled by an m-worker while they work towards translating Genesis and Exodus into their native language; a long, tedious process.
- 7. We joined our friends on Sunday morning when they met together to divide the Word of God. This group of believers has become more organized and grows larger each year we visit.
- 8. Our indigenous friends introduced us to a recent venture to start a small for profit school to teach English. We later learned that they decided to close the school temporarily while they restructure the leadership team and find a more affordable building to rent. We shared some ideas to create a formal leadership team and establish a covenant among the teachers to ensure there is a commitment to fulfill their obligation to lead their respective classes. Long term this school could potentially support several believers that have been persecuted against and unable to find employment. As more of a note, the local Muslim clerics are banning together to pressure the government to force the m-workers to leave the country.

We thank you, for none of this would be possible without your prayer and support. By the grace of God our plan is to return next September and do much of the same. They need the love of Jesus desperately in this country where He is not known by most all who live there. We recognize that we play a very small role compared to many that have been there for years and are immersed daily in the fight. It is however exciting to know that with the small role that we all play; the Holy Spirit can do incredibly great things to grow His kingdom.

May God inspire others to join us next year in reaching out to the people of this very different culture sharing the knowledge and love of Jesus Christ that can transform hearts, minds and souls. 5 What then is Apollos? What is Paul? Servants through

So if you have not been trustworthy in handling worldly wealth, who will trust you with true riches? Luke 16:11 NIV Like many endeavors, managing household resources requires effort, discipline, and structure. We need to make time to understand our household cash flow and manage it accordingly. If you don't do it, who will, if not now, when? An oversimplified plan is to give back to the Lord, spend less than we earn and save a little each payday over an extended period of time.

Crown Financial offers the following guideline to help you evaluate your spending habits and commitments. I often times refer to it as a "checkup from the neck up." Keep in mind this is a guide to help you compare your current spending habits with what they consider the appropriate balance. You might be slightly different because of situations that are unique to a temporary situation, however, you want to be alerted by categories that might be considered a substantial departure (i.e. transportation at 25%, debt at > 10%, miscellaneous > 14%, etc.).

FRANK EIKLOR VISITS HOPE FELLOWSHIP WITH A MESSAGE OF REVIVAL

"So as I was coming in, I was checking out (from my plane window), to see it there were any big fires burning; I saw a lot of lights but no big fires. So I thought, Oh, Lord, could you do it again? I'm gonna be at Hope...and LORD, there's another Moody there!" Frank Eiklor, founder and director of Shalom International, evangelist and missionary for Jesus Christ, visited our New Hampshire community for a few days in October. He came with a prayer in his heart for Revival, like the one that happened in the 1800's when God used Dwight L. Moody to ignite the Chicago area with the message of repentance and faith in Jesus. Frank prayed for Pastor Jordan, that God would use him at Hope Fellowship to light a fire in hearts that will never go out, to give the whole counsel of God and cause people to take a stand for Jesus.

With straightforward preaching and scriptures recited from "the deliciousness of the word of God," Frank challenged and blessed the hearers who showed up on Friday night and Sunday morning for the Revival Messages that had been prepared ahead of time.

He told us that in other parts of the world, China, for one, God's church is alive and on fire for Jesus and one day the Chinese Christians plan to come to America to preach the "original Lord, not the forgery, to extol the original revelation of the scriptures, to expose modern interpretation, and to preach the practice of the original meaning of discipleship, which is, Jesus gave you everything; now He demands everything!"

To sum it up, Frank explained that when a Chinese person becomes a Christian, he becomes a target of persecution. In spite of that, the Church in China meets in individual homes, over 5,000 of them, and they are on the move with a plan to go to the non-Arab Muslim countries, the Arab-Muslim countries, to Jerusalem, across Europe and someday reach America. They know that it's likely many of them will die on this mission; still they plan to come. They are praying for the American Christian, because

"revival is necessary for any body who is threatening to become a corpse" and the American Christian Church in their perspective, is threatening to become a corpse. "I want to beat them (the Chinese Christians) to your house," Frank said, "You tell them when they come that we heard the same message from this old guy, Eiklor was his name..." Frank had us laughing with his signature style of poking fun at himself while sharing truth with love. Frank used humor on Saturday night to address couples and single adults on the biblical standard of marriage. Sunday morning was a message again with a revival theme and Sunday night, the youth showed up at Hope. There were sixty or so teens and young adults who came for pizza and the Word of God, Frank-style.

Monday night, Oct. 17th, Frank met with the Elders of Hope, to encourage them and pray with them and stayed to take part in the Men's Bible study afterwards. For an eighty-year old man, his energy and enthusiasm was remarkable and contagious. To paraphrase Frank, he would hope that the fire of God's Word would start a revival in each of our hearts, and it would "keep on burning, keep on going, keep on trusting," until Christ returns.


